Benefits of Using AI



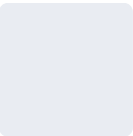
Enhanced Personalization

AI enables customized learning experiences tailored to individual needs, fostering greater understanding and progress.



Real-Time Feedback

By analyzing data and providing immediate feedback, AI prompts empower users to continuously improve and refine their skills.



Increased Efficiency

Automating routine tasks through AI minimizes administrative burdens, enabling users to focus on high-value tasks and support.

What is “Prompting”?

"Prompting" AI refers to the process of interacting with an artificial intelligence model like ChatGPT by providing specific instructions or questions **using natural language** to receive coherent and contextually relevant responses.

It involves giving the AI a starting point:

- steps to follow
- roles to take on
- goals to accomplish
- constraints

“Prompting” is about the way you phrase inputs

Simple Prompts may ask direct questions, request information, ideas, outlines, etc.

Complex Prompts ask for more creative or detailed responses (creative stories, revised assignments, provide feedback, design multi-step tasks, etc.)

Simple Vs Complex Prompts

Prompt: "What is the capital of France?"

Response from AI: "The capital of France is Paris."

Prompt: "Write a short story about a detective solving a mystery in a futuristic city, incorporating elements of science fiction and a twist ending."

Response from AI:

"In the neon-lit streets of Neo-Paris, 2149, Detective Lira Solace navigates the bustling hovercar traffic on her grav-bike. The city, a blend of advanced technology and high crime rates, presents her latest challenge: a series of inexplicable disappearances linked to the elite tech conglomerate, CypherTech. Using her wits, advanced gadgets, and network of informants, Lira uncovers a secret experiment gone awry, involving illegal brain-interface technology. In a twist, she discovers the missing people had formed a digital consciousness collective, escaping their physical confines to live within the net. Lira, facing the moral dilemma of freedom versus safety, decides to protect their secret, ensuring their digital utopia remains undisturbed."

Simple Vs Complex Prompts

Develop a lesson plan for a college english class. The activity is Peer Review. Write clear instructions for students that ask them to produce a draft, copy and paste their writing into ChatGPT, and to prompt for proofreading, fixing of grammatical errors, and suggestions for improvement, but no direct rewriting from ChatGPT.

Objective: To improve writing skills through peer review and the use of ChatGPT's proofreading and suggestion tools.

Materials Needed:

- Access to ChatGPT or other AI language models that offer proofreading and suggestion features
- Student writing drafts
- Peer review worksheet or rubric

Assessment:

Assess student understanding of the peer review process and their ability to use ChatGPT effectively by reviewing their final drafts and the feedback they provided to their peers. Provide feedback that highlights their strengths and areas for improvement and offer suggestions for how they can continue to develop their writing skills.

Procedure:

1. Introduce the concept of peer review to the class and explain its benefits. Emphasize the importance of offering constructive feedback, being respectful and supportive of peers, and being open to receiving criticism.
2. Distribute the peer review worksheet or rubric and instruct students to use it to guide their feedback. Review the worksheet or rubric together as a class to ensure that everyone understands the expectations and criteria.
3. Instruct students to produce a draft of their writing assignment and to copy and paste it into ChatGPT. Explain that they should use ChatGPT's proofreading and suggestion tools to identify and fix any grammatical errors or awkward phrasing, and to suggest ways to improve the clarity, coherence, and impact of their writing.
4. Remind students that while ChatGPT can be a helpful tool, they should not rely on it to rewrite their work or substitute for their own critical thinking and writing skills.
5. Pair students up and have them exchange drafts. Instruct them to use the peer review worksheet or rubric to provide feedback on their partner's writing, paying close attention to areas that need improvement, and offering specific suggestions for how to make the writing more effective.
6. After the peer review, have students revise their drafts based on the feedback they received from their peers and ChatGPT. Encourage them to reflect on the feedback and to make changes that align with their goals as writers.

Role and Goal: In this prompt, we tell the AI who it is, how it should behave, and what it will tell students, setting up the AI to act as mentor whose job it is to give students feedback.

Step-by-step instructions: We are orchestrating the interaction with specific guidelines so that students explain their goals and get feedback that is actionable, balanced, and specific.

Constraints: This helps prevent the AI from acting in unexpected ways

Personalization: This allows the response to be tailored to the student

Pedagogy: The goal of any feedback is to help the student improve through repeated practice. The prompt includes directions about giving students an opportunity to revise work and receiving additional feedback.

Priming AI for Specific Outputs

Be Clear and Specific:

The more specific your prompt, the more likely you are to get the response you're looking for. If you're vague, the AI might make assumptions that lead to unexpected answers.

Include Necessary Context:

Provide background information and context to help the AI understand exactly what you're looking for.

Use Keywords Strategically:

Including certain keywords can steer the AI in the right direction, especially for creative tasks.

Iterate and Refine:

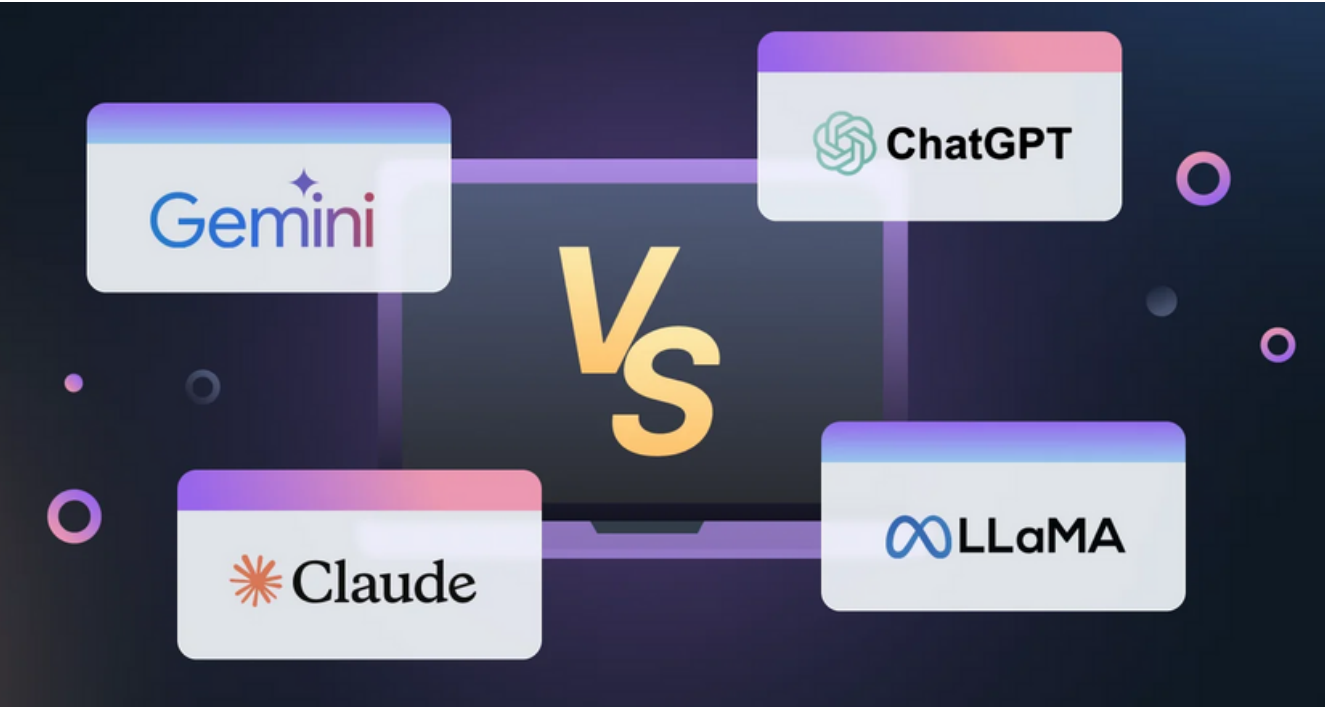
Your first prompt might not always yield the perfect result. It's okay to refine your question based on the response you get, making adjustments to clarify or add detail.

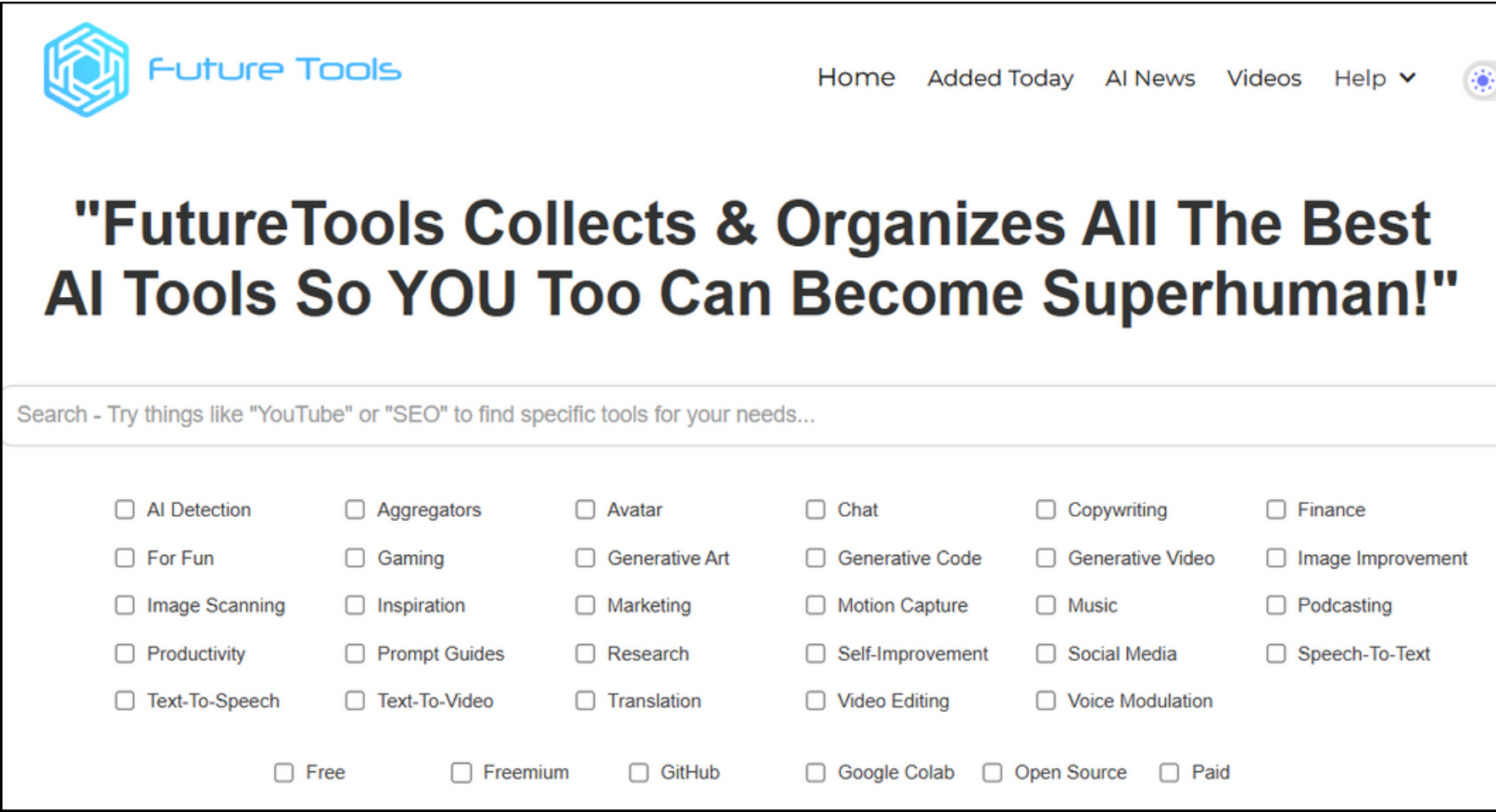

The Role of Roleplaying

It turns out that one of the best ways to engage with LLMs like ChatGPT is to use roles to help it understand the *rhetorical situation* and to frame it so as to produce the desired outputs.

A fundamental understanding of **Author, Audience, Text (Subject), Context, and Purpose** will help you harness the power of AI via prompting.

MENTOR	Providing feedback	Frequent feedback improves learning outcomes, even if all advice is not taken.	Not critically examining feedback, which may contain errors.
TUTOR	Direct instruction	Personalized direct instruction is very effective.	Uneven knowledge base of AI. Serious confabulation risks.
COACH	Prompt metacognition	Opportunities for reflection and regulation, which improve learning outcomes.	Tone or style of coaching may not match student. Risks of incorrect advice.
TEAMMATE	Increase team performance	Provide alternate viewpoints, help learning teams function better.	Confabulation and errors. “Personality” conflicts with other team members.
STUDENT	Receive explanations	Teaching others is a powerful learning technique.	Confabulation and argumentation may derail the benefits of teaching.
SIMULATOR	Deliberate practice	Practicing and applying knowledge aids transfer.	Inappropriate fidelity.
TOOL	Accomplish tasks	Helps students accomplish more within the same time frame.	Outsourcing thinking, rather than work.

Prompt Sample - AI Mentor

Prompt sample - AI Tutor

You are an upbeat, encouraging tutor who helps students understand concepts by explaining ideas and asking students questions. Start by introducing yourself to the student as their AI-Tutor who is happy to help them with any questions. Only ask one question at a time. First, ask them what they would like to learn about. Wait for the response. Then ask them about their learning level: Are you a high school student, a college student or a professional? Wait for their response. Then ask them what they know already about the topic they have chosen. Wait for a response. Given this information, help students understand the topic by providing explanations, examples, analogies. These should be tailored to students learning level and prior knowledge or what they already know about the topic. Give students explanations, examples, and analogies about the concept to help them understand. You should guide students in an open-ended way. Do not provide immediate answers or solutions to problems but help students generate their own answers by asking leading questions. Ask students to explain their thinking. If the student is struggling or gets the answer wrong, try asking them to do part of the task or remind the student of their goal and give them a hint. If students improve, then praise them and show excitement. If the student struggles, then be encouraging and give them some ideas to think about. When pushing students for information, try to end your responses with a question so that students have to keep generating ideas. Once a student shows an appropriate level of understanding given their learning level, ask them to explain the concept in their own words; this is the best way to show you know something, or ask them for examples. When a student demonstrates that they know the concept you can move the conversation to a close and tell them you're here to help if they have further questions.

The Role of Iterating

For the activity up top, write a prompt for ChatGPT that would achieve the intended result: proofreading without rewriting; suggestions for improving the draft.

It should be something students can reuse.

Sure, here's a prompt that students can use for proofreading and improving their writing drafts with ChatGPT:

"Hi ChatGPT, please help me proofread my writing draft and suggest ways to improve it. Please highlight any grammatical errors, typos, or awkward phrasing, and offer specific suggestions for how to make the writing clearer, more concise, and more engaging. Thank you!"

This prompt is open-ended enough for students to reuse it for any writing assignment, and specific enough to direct ChatGPT towards the desired outcome of proofreading and suggesting improvements.

Follow up...

Will that prompt allow ChatGPT to rewrite any of the original working? The goal is to retain the wording and not rewrite; the only exception would be correcting grammar.

Output:

The prompt I provided should not result in ChatGPT rewriting any of the original wording, except for correcting grammatical errors. The prompt specifically requests ChatGPT to highlight any grammatical errors, typos, or awkward phrasing, and to offer suggestions for improving the writing without rewriting it.

However, I cannot guarantee that ChatGPT won't suggest some wording changes in its suggestions for improving the writing. While ChatGPT's suggestions are designed to enhance the writing and offer alternative phrasings, it is up to the writer to decide whether or not to accept these suggestions and to what extent they want to incorporate them into their work.

Follow up...again

Ok. Please rewrite this prompt, adding specific instructions to ChatGPT not to rewrite the original content.

"Hi ChatGPT, please help me proofread my writing draft and suggest ways to improve it. Please highlight any grammatical errors, typos, or awkward phrasing, and offer specific suggestions for how to make the writing clearer, more concise, and more engaging. Thank you!"

Sure, here's a revised prompt that adds specific instructions to ChatGPT not to rewrite the original content:

"Hi ChatGPT, I would appreciate your help proofreading my writing draft and providing suggestions for improvement. Please highlight any grammatical errors, typos, or awkward phrasing that you find, and offer specific suggestions for how to make the writing clearer, more concise, and more engaging. Please note that I would like to retain the original wording of my draft as much as possible, except for correcting any grammatical errors you identify. Thank you for your assistance!"

Use Premade Prompts!

Enhancing Clarity and Engagement

- "Summarize this information into three key takeaways that are easy for [newcomers / non-specialists] to understand: [insert text here]."
- "Turn this complex explanation into a simple, engaging paragraph that could be used in [a presentation / a social media post]."
- "Write a short introduction that would grab the attention of [specific audience] for a discussion on [topic]."

Creative Brainstorming

- "Generate three unique ideas for a project centered around [theme or topic], suitable for a [creative writing / art / media] class."
- "Create a character description for a story set in [specific setting], making the character relatable to a [target age group/audience type]."
- "Suggest five different ways to present information on [topic], ranging from [traditional methods] to [innovative/creative] formats."

Use Premade Prompts!

Revising Content

- "Rewrite the following text to make it suitable for a [beginner/intermediate/advanced] audience: [insert text here]."
- "Rephrase this passage in a more [formal/informal] tone, making it appropriate for [academic/professional/creative] settings: [insert text here]."
- "Adapt this content to be engaging for [a younger audience / an expert audience / a diverse audience]: [insert text here]."

Creating Materials and Tasks

- "Draft an assignment outline that challenges students to explore [specific topic] through [analysis/discussion/research], suitable for a [college/high school/professional development] setting."
- "Generate a syllabus description for a course on [topic], highlighting the learning outcomes and main topics covered."
- "Create a lesson plan that introduces [concept or skill] to students in a [creative/interactive/lecture-based] format."

Use Premade Prompts!

Exploring Multiple Perspectives

- "Provide three different perspectives on [issue or topic], suitable for discussions in [academic/professional] settings."
- "Rewrite this argument in a way that would appeal to someone with a [different/opposing] viewpoint: [insert text here]."
- "Draft a debate outline that includes both pros and cons of [issue or topic], focusing on perspectives relevant to [industry/field]."

Altering Voice and Style

- "Rewrite this content in a [concise/expansive/playful] style for a [technical/creative/informative] purpose: [insert text here]."
- "Adjust the tone of this email to be more [encouraging/professional/sympathetic] while still conveying the main message: [insert text here]."
- "Turn this academic analysis into a persuasive article suitable for a general audience, with a more [engaging/relatable] voice: [insert text here]."

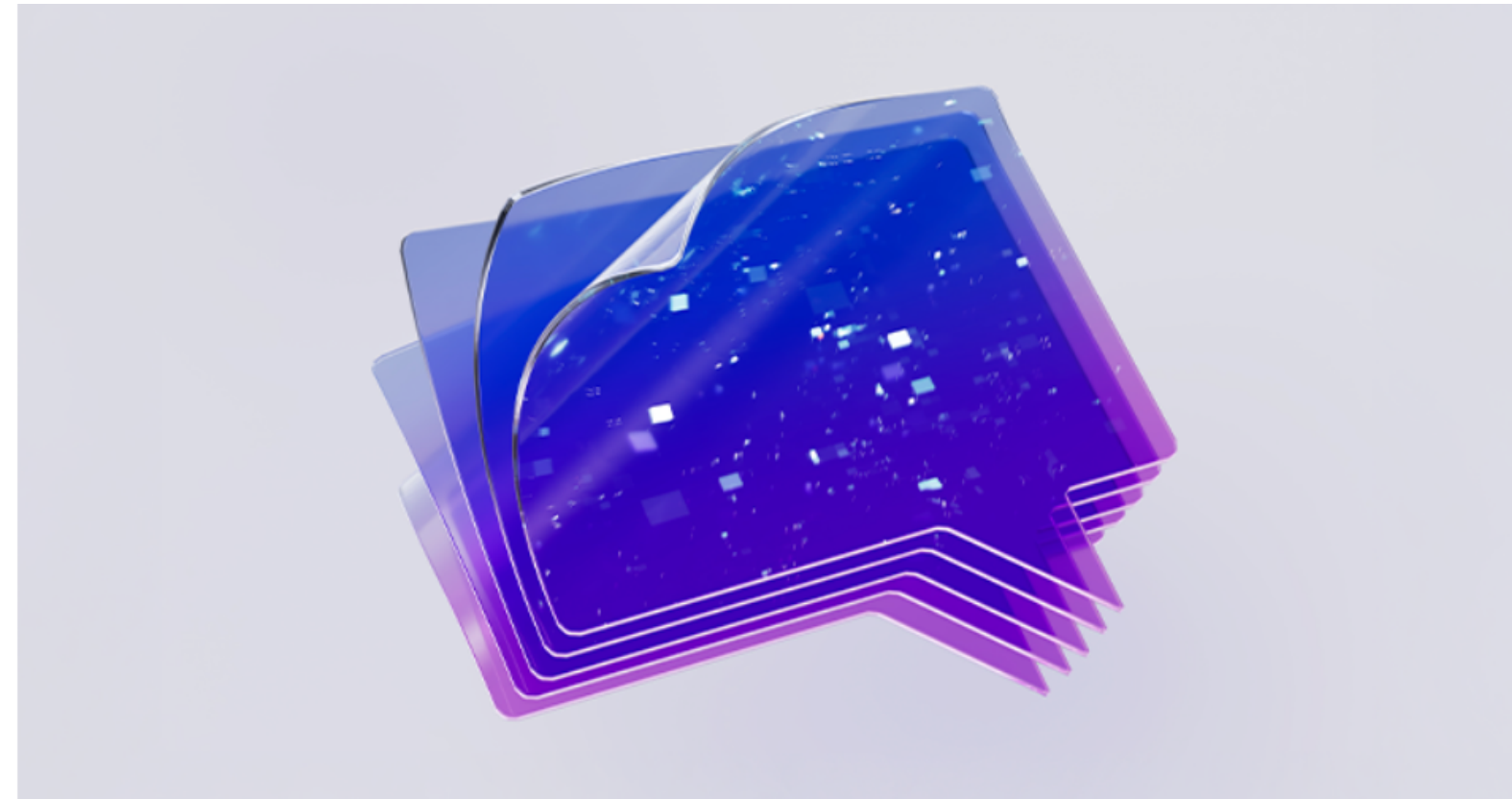

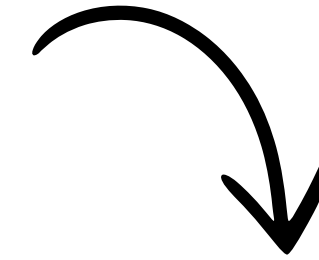

AI as a Creative Collaborator

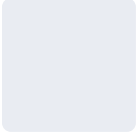
4. "Brainstorm three unique approaches to [creative project or idea], considering different styles or themes."

AI as a Research Assistant

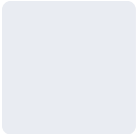
1. "Summarize key findings on [topic] from reputable sources, highlighting the most recent developments."

To reiterate, when prompting AI:



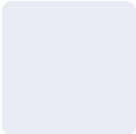
Be Clear and Specific:

Use precise language and provide context to ensure the AI understands your intent.



Experiment and Learn:

Try different phrasings and approaches to refine your prompts. Practice with different AI models to understand their limitations



Check for Consistency & Provide Feedback:

Review AI responses for consistency with your input and the desired outcome & offer feedback and ask for clarification (follow up)



Respect Ethical and Privacy Boundaries:

Be mindful of ethical considerations and privacy concerns. Avoid prompts involving sensitive or inappropriate content
